### 1 Introduction

#### 1.1 Background

1.1.1 The tables followed summarises the preliminary assessment of climate change risk to the Project. This assessment will be updated in the ES as the design of the Project develops and other assessments such as flood risk assessment are completed.

#### 1.2 Climate Change Risk Assessment

- 1.2.1 Tables 2-1 to 2-3 present the climate change risks associated with each phase of the Project, from construction through operation (including maintenance) to decommissioning.
- 1.2.2 The time-period for the initial risk rating of each phase of the Project reflects the period of the obtained climate change projection data (e.g. projections for 2020-2039 cover the estimated construction period of 2026-2028).
- 1.2.3 Future climate projections have been reviewed and the sensitivity of assets have been examined, initial risks are assessed before commenting on the adequacy of the embedded climate change mitigation measures (as presented in Section 14.3 of Chapter 14: Climate Change) built into the Project.
- 1.2.4 Identified climate variables are given a significance rating, based upon the likelihood of an impact occurring to the Project and the anticipated consequences. This includes consideration of embedded mitigation measures.
